With a season that included the winning of five major championships, Baldwin High school athletes brought to a close this year's season with a record of 10-1-1. The regular season was highlighted by Tom Spiegl's brilliant team of players. The regular squad consisted of: ends, Dunn and Pete Gahn; tackles, Capt. Blumkin and Phil; guards, Ed Brungar and Bob Joyce; center, Bob Little; quarterback, Frank Watts; fullback, Spiegel and Dick McConkie; fullback, Keller.

At this time the greatest praise for the success of the 1943 season must be given to Coach Hal Helmer, who was his first season as mentor of the Maple Eleven, and he certainly made it a great one by regaining the Little Brown Jug and the TVAA championship.

Cross country, the other fall sport, which achieved great success in previous years under Coach Ernest Engel, suffered a severe setback this year as Coach Engel's departure left the squad without a coach. Were it not for the effort put forth by Tom Milk, debrandt, a junior and later elected captain of the team, the sport would probably have been lost. Under the leadership of Tom and J. J. Myers, faculty adviser, the team was successful in finishing third in the TVAA meet and second in the State Area meet.
