The third session of the Kingswood Summer Institute for girls and women will finish this year's program tomorrow with a satisfactory record of accomplishment.

Attendance this year more than doubled previous records and the enthusiasm of the students has been most stimulating, according to Miss Frances Reese, director.

One of the most interesting studies was weaving, which included the use of dies made from local vegetation. This group included Mary Baker and Joanna Tall, of Birmingham; Jill Craig and

Margaret Barton, of Bloomfield Hills; Mary Ann Gabley, of Pontiac; Connie Hadley and Marilyn Swooper, of Pleasant Ridge. Three of the girls have made materials for suits, while others chose to make luncheon sets, rags and scarves. All of the girls have produced something useful while learning a fascinating craft, which can be enjoyed at home.

Instruction was given by Lillian Holm of the regular Kingswood faculty. Courses in home economics included instruction in cooking and clothing and were well attended by younger girls and women whose interest has been increased by conditions due to the war. Among those attending these classes were Margery Clark, Mrs. C. A. Sundberg, Mrs. H. P. Halladay and Mrs. R. E. Wheeler, of Birmingham; Mary Booth, Patsy Chubbuck, Jill Craig and Elizabeth Gallogly, of Bloomfield Hills; and Mrs. Harold Williams, of Pontiac. Instruction was given by Katherine Trumbull, Typing and shorthand classes with Mrs. Garland Tall as instructor made exceptional progress in the six weeks summer session of concentrated effort.

Thirty-one girls and women, from Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, and Pontiac completed the course.

"Because these medical corps functions are not a Red Cross program it would seem that this needs clarification and that credit should be given these sturdy soldiers.

"The army and many of many nations including the United States use a Red Cross as the official identification for medical personnel and equipment. This procedure has been sanctioned by the Treaty of Geneva.

"The American National Red Cross is anxious that the public should know that care of the wounded on the battle field is not a Red Cross function."

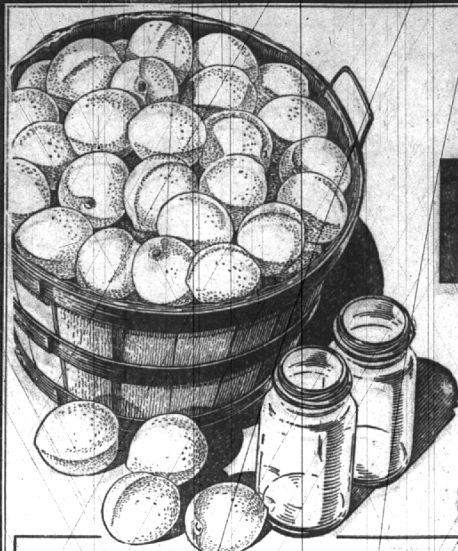
