

Former Local Man Killed In Crash

Funeral services for Floyd Cliff-ton Martin, former Birmingham resident, fatally injured last Thursday night when his car crashed into the abutment of the railroad viaduct on East 14 Mile road, were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Manly Bailey funeral home. The Rev. Max O. Moore, of Embury Methodist church, was in charge and burial was in Oakview cemetery, Royal Oak.

A passing motorist discovered Mr. Martin in his car shortly after the accident. He was unconscious when pulled from the burning machine, and taken to St. Joseph Mercy hospital in Pontiac where he died Friday.

Mr. Martin was born in La Rose, Illinois, October 23, 1917, and came to Oakland county 19 years ago. He attended Log Cabin school in Clawson and married Vivian Pitman on July 4, 1937.

Surviving are his wife and two sons, Earl and Robert, at the family home at 1536 North Atlantic, Royal Oak; his father, Clifford W. Martin, 540 George street, Birmingham; three brothers, James and John of Birmingham; one sister serving in the U.S. Navy and three sisters, Ida Martin, Birmingham; Mrs. James H. Hill, Royal Oak and Mrs. William Coppen, Ferndale.

Mr. Stewart was born in Saginaw and was graduated from the University of Michigan in 1916.

Since 1916 he had represented various magazines in the Detroit field, including the Literary Digest and National Geographic.

He is survived by his wife, Martha C., one brother, John Stewart of Detroit and a sister, Mrs. William F. Taylor of Evanston, Ill.
