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Christmas Mailing Advice

The following timely Christmas mailing advice was prepared by Postmaster Joseph A. Byrne, of the local postoffice:

From the 15th to the 24th of December, all important business mail should be mailed in long business envelopes so that they can be distinguished readily from Greeting Cards. It is urgently requested that patrons mailing large numbers of Christmas Cards from the out of town in order to facilitate the handling. It is suggested that bulk mailings not be deposited in city letter boxes, but be tied in bundles labeled "Local" or "Out of Town" and handed in at the Post Office window.

In order to avoid waiting in line it would be advisable to buy your supply of Christmas stamps now. In order to have your greeting cards delivered before Christmas it is not too early to mail your out of town mail now.

Special attention should be given to all A.P.O., overseas Greeting Cards. They are first class mail and require 3c postage. Parcel post packages should be well packed and securely tied. In the case of fragile articles, particularly the box should be twice the size of the article and well cushioned on all sides, plainly marked "Fragile." Both the name of the sender and the addressee should be applied to one side of the parcel only.

Perishable Articles should be sent special delivery and special handling and plainly marked "Perishable."

Attention is called to the mailing of greeting cards for the 1 1/2c postage does not permit the privilege of forwarding and return, while the 3c postage entitles you to this service.

Home Service Group Of Red Cross Headed Strictly Fresh

Service to servicemen returning from combat areas is one of the important activities of home service. One of our country's foremost American Red Cross "excellent" to Mrs. E. P. Turner of Westin drive, Birmingham, the home service chairman.

Employment for the returned soldier is one of the first considerations; first he is referred to a former employer, then to a veteran replacement officer. In the interim the man may file application for adjustment unemployment allowance. The veteran is assisted with problems of all kinds, including unemployment allowance. In case of disability, information is given to him and guidance for rehabilitation training.

Pine Lake veterans' vocational training school located near Cheltenham is open to the veteran for educational or vocational training and admittance to this camp may be arranged by Red Cross home service. Home service offices are at 410 People's State building, Pontiac, and at 116 E. Fourth Street, Royal Oak.

Hospitalization or pension benefits are other matters which the veteran may discuss with home service and assistance for these benefits is arranged by Red Cross. If disability is greater than ten percent the soldier is referred to the veterans' administration for vocational training, further education, retraining or refreshment courses.

Financial assistance includes information as to procedures for obtaining loans. Red Cross gives financial aid to disabled veterans and their families waiting for pension claims. If the claim is denied Red Cross continues aid until the case may be referred to another local agency. Basic maintenance is given to able bodied men during the first period of adjustment, upon determination of emergent need.
