Of course, Dean Gordon Watkins of the College of Letters and Science at Los Angeles, whose stirring but somewhat trite plea for the liberal arts you published last Thursday is doubtless sincere in protesting against a world change in education which threatens to rob him of a job. But one cannot help wonder how "the security and peace of our people" has been assured by the vast amount of time, energy and money expended thus far on the so-called liberal arts course in our schools. Doubtless the editor is right in commenting that the "purpose of a liberal arts college is to train a student in a completely rounded acquaintance of the world in which he lives, and to develop the power of intelligent thinking." However, there is a little evidence that the liberal arts courses that such objectives have been strenuously pursued, certainly not with the clarity of administrative thinking which lay gone into the development of professional and technical education.

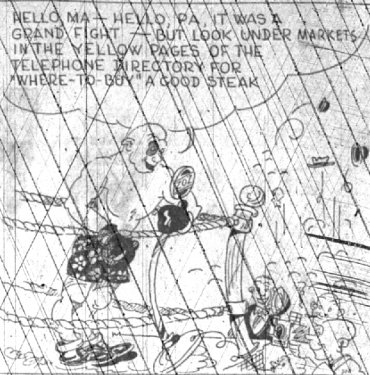
In October 27 overseas boxes were mailed. And during the last few days 47 boxes were sent to the boys and men stationed in the United States.
