On the civilian side of the ledger it serves Office of Civilian Defense, Blood Bank, paper salvage, Metal salvage, War Bond drives, selective service, service to Army hospitals, Red Cross organizational driving, U. S. Post Office common carrier service.

On the Armed Forces side of the ledger it serves in transportation of personnel, motor pool and volunteer carrier service.

Specifically, what has it done for its community? Here are a few instances: Over 18 tons of salvage have been collected and packed to salvage dealers for reconversion to war needs. This amount in the space of five months, and 10 tons of it last month.

Military secrecy forbids the use of complete statistics, but it can be told that more than one driver has personally delivered for the Army as many as 800 vehicles ranging from jeeps to GMC "ducks."

Hundreds of blood donors have been called for and delivered to their homes by competent, courteous drivers trained in first aid.

Selectees from Birmingham have been driven with dignity and promptness from the Municipal Building to their trains.

Future soldiers from this area, nervously pressing themselves for the pre-induction medical examination, have been reassured, cared for and aided by specially trained Motor Corps members.

Trained drivers stand ready to report to posts all over this area in event of disaster caused by nature or enemy action. They are the transportation corps of civilian defense. If there should be bombing, these women will be out in it.

All these services require personnel. This work is done by women who have households and who, in these mad days, are unable to devote as much time to Motor Corps as they wish.
