

This week on display in our window is the actual Dried Blood Plasma from one pint of human blood to which is added 250cc (8 ounces) of pure water, making normal human plasma ready for immediate use.

This method was developed in the laboratories of Sharpe & Dohme and was chosen in 1940 as the official blood substitute for use by our armed

Since that time their method has been made available to other appointed pharmaceutical houses and through the work of the American Red Cross the blood We Donate to them is converted to plasma and distributed to our Armed Forces wherever they might be.

Normal human plasma does not require refrigeration. It is put up in a sterile ampul-vial together with the sterile ampul-vial of distilled water in a practical, portable package.
