Civil Service Aids Case of Birmingham Liquor Store Chief

Birmingham residents will be interested in the following news story out of Lansing regarding the Birmingham liquor store management case:

LANSING, Feb. 15—Norman Fisher was removed as manager of the Birmingham State liquor store shortly after he criticized supervision in the Detroit area at a meeting of 27 managers, but Russell H. MacKenzie, supervisor, denied in a Civil Service appeal hearing Tuesday that the circumstances were connected.

MacKenzie's thoroughness in investigating complaints that Fisher was discourteous and rude to customers, the basis of Fisher's dismissal was inquired into by the appeal board.

MacKenzie claimed that Lansing supervisors ordered the action after his investigation but then made surprising admission that all complaints were reviewed by him after Fisher's actual service from the payroll. Field auditors of the Liquor Control Commission gave Fisher's handling of the store a clean bill of health.

The Birmingham manager was on sick leave when he was dismissed and replaced by Ellery Browne II, on Jan. 4.

A few days later a shortage of five and one-half cases of whiskey allegedly stolen by an eight-year-old employee was reported. MacKenzie blamed Fisher for firing this employee "contrary to rules of the Commission."

Fisher was supported by Mrs. Mary Ross, cashier of the store, in denying MacKenzie's allegations of discourtesy and late charges since in the Birmingham press.
