Must Apply Soon For Scholarships

A better opportunity than ever before is being offered the graduates of Baldwin high school this year to attend the University of Michigan through its recently greatly-enlarged scholarship program.

Mrs. Robert F. Watt, 1215 Yorkshire, has just been named chairman of the Scholarship Committee of the University of Michigan which has charge of evaluating applicants for awards. Other members of the committee named by the president, Mrs. Robert Atkins are: Mrs. L. S. Sappington and Mrs. Hugh White.

The scholarships pay the tuition for the freshman year and will be renewed for each of the three remaining years as long as the holder's performance warrants such action.

To apply, the student should ask his principal or superintendent for three forms from the University which he already has. He fills these out and returns two to the principal, the other one going to Mrs. Watt, the Alumni club committee chairman.

The deadline for the applications is March 1. As soon as these are filled out, they should be mailed to R. O. Morgan, Alumni Office, Ann Arbor.
