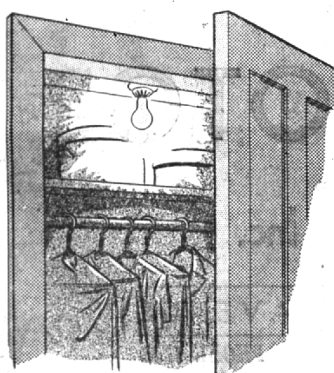

Religion School
To Open Monday

The Birmingham School of Religion will open next Monday night, February 22, in the First Baptist Church on Willett Street will be continue for six Monday nights from 7:30 to 9:30. It is expected that some 150 persons will attend the school.

The courses are designed to interest both teachers in the church schools and others who might be attracted by the general courses.

The course, "The Message of the Prophets for Their Day and Our Day" will interest many who are not teachers and the "Recreational Leadership Workshop" should interest any who wish to be up to date on materials and methods in leading home, church or community groups in recreation.

The school is unusually fortunate in the quality of the teachers. Mrs. Allen Goldsby, director of religious education for the Detroit Council of Churches is well known to many church people in Birmingham.

George Carhart was popular in the school last year and undoubtedly will have a very interesting class.

Miss Olive Robinson, deaconess, St. James Episcopal came to Birmingham about a year ago after a varied and interesting experience in Northern Michigan as a worker with the smaller churches. She organized some very unusual youth work.

Jo Kreiner is a trained social worker with a special interest in the field of recreation. She has been active in the Detroit Recreation Co-operative and has taught special courses in Wayne University.

The school is open to anyone who is interested and the total cost is one dollar in addition to text books.

Registrations may be made at the offices of the Presbyterian, Christ Church Cranbrook, First Baptist, First Methodist, First St. James Episcopal churches and the Y.M.C.A. in the Community House.

CHANGE GUN PERMITS

Ration Tokens Soon
To Be Placed In Use
By Birmingham Folk

The following highly interesting information regarding the use of the "tokens" in connection with the food rationing program, was provided through the publicity department of the ration board, members of which have expressed the hope that the information will prove helpful to housewives of Birmingham and this area:

The use of tokens in the Food Rationing Program which will begin on Sunday, Feb. 22, is a simplified version of the plan now in use. When housewives start to use red and blue stamps in Book IV, all stamps regardless of the 8, 5, 2 or 1 printed on them will have a value of 10 points. All tokens have a value of 1 point each.

It is not necessary to obtain a supply of tokens, as the merchants will give them in change for stamps, red tokens for red stamps and blue tokens for blue stamps. For example, if you purchase 7 points worth of meat, you will give the butcher a red stamp and he will give you back 3 red tokens. Tokens have no expiration date.

Stamps will become valid according to dates published in the papers. Three red stamps (total 30 points) will become valid every two weeks. Five blue stamps (total 50 points) become valid on Feb. 27th and do not expire until May 20th. Under the new system, 15 red points will be the allotment per week as compared to 16 at the present time. The changes in allotments will be taken into consideration when the new point values are established, so the same quantity of food will be received.

Consumers will not be allowed to change stamps into tokens without making a purchase of a rationed commodity.

On Feb. 27th several stamps which were made valid previously will still be in use. These are green stamps, K, L and M in Book IV and brown stamps Y and Z in Book II. All these stamps will remain valid until March 20. However they will not be used like the red and blue stamps. They will have a value of 8, 5, 2 and 1 points as indicated. Tokens will not be given in change for these stamps.

Ration Books will last longer under this plan and once they are accustomed to it, housewives will find it easier to figure points and make change using 10-point stamps and 1-point tokens.

M.S.C. Again Offers
Scholarships to 64
High School Seniors

Sixty-four undergraduate scholarships having a total value of \$7,680 will be offered graduates of accredited Michigan high schools this year by Michigan State college alumni, according to an announcement received today from Glen O. Stewart, alumni secretary.

There will be a minimum of one award made in each of the state's 42 senatorial districts. The individual scholarship amounts to \$120—or \$40 a quarter—and represents a waiver of tuition by the college, exclusive of matriculation fee. If scholastic standards are maintained, the grant may be continued through the entire college course of 12 quarters.

Applications for scholarships will be handled by alumni committees in the districts. Each may choose a maximum of six candidates and to be eligible applicants must have been in the upper one-third of their class and their economic status must warrant financial aid. April 15 is the deadline for filing applications with district chairmen, whose names are available from high school principals. Scholarships will be designated by a college faculty committee after an examination of contestants early in May at five places in the state.

Food for U. S. Civilians—Civilians in the United States will have more frozen vegetables during the next five months as a result of an expected all-time record high production. WPA has announced. Usually available in frozen form are snap beans, corn kernels, peas, spinach, string beans, Brussels sprouts, cauliflower, and corn on the cob. U. S. civilians will have slightly less rice in 1943 than during recent years and less canned milk than during 1942, although the amount of canned milk available will be in approximate proportion to civilian purchases under rationing, which began in June, 1942.
