Serve 6,035 Plate Lunches At School Since November 20th

Birmingham has participated in the Michigan school lunch program since Nov. 20, 1943. The program was inaugurated in the interest of better health for the children of Birmingham at a modest cost. It provides lunch for the children in the elementary schools at two cents per plate less than the market price, and permits the cafeteria in the Baldwin junior high school and Baldwin senior high school to serve a well-balanced hot lunch of high nutritional value, at a very modest cost.

Up to Feb. 14, 6,035 plate lunches have been served in the high school and 11,830 bottles of milk have been consumed by elementary school children. A reimbursement of \$780.95 has come to the individual schools to cover a portion of the total cost. The remainder of the cost is paid by the children.

Playing basketball in the largest home crowd of the season, the Birmingham men teachers defeated the Lions 23 to 12, in a fast, excitement-packed contest, the proceeds of which will go to Baldwin's 10th graders.

After a close fought first quarter in which both teams were sharing their sights on the basket, the teachers put on the steam in the second stanza by scoring 14 points to the Lions' two to take a 21 to 11 lead at the end of the half.

The second half the teachers kept up their high scoring ways to put the game on ice while the Lions kept on fighting and netted nine points. Midway in the third quarter the entire crowd came to its feet when Captain Jay "Munk" Myers of the teachers was "knocked out" and given first aid by the club's trainer, "Doc" Ireland. The injury was not serious and Captain Myers returned to action later. During the time-out period between the third and fourth quarters, lunch was served to the ragers by Manager "Bullet" Bill Brown.

Setting the pace for the victors was Hal Helmer, Baldwin football coach, who led a total of 16 points. Close behind him with 12 points was the basketball coach, Lloyd Cooper.

The Lions, despite their defeat, fought hard and furnished the crowd with all share of colorful play. Individual honors for the Lions go to Bud Bell with a seven point lead. Before the game Coach John Springman mentioned the rigorous training through which his team had been put and predicted a close battle.

All proceeds from this game, the first of its kind in history, go toward the spring sports—baseball, track, tennis, and golf—for which no admission is charged and which, therefore, have no large source of revenue.

A welcome sight to all was the appearance of Ernest Euel, coach of basketball and track for the first two years, as referee for the contest.
