

## Lenten Services Are Planned for Christ Church Cranbrook

The first Sunday in Lent will be celebrated by Christ Church Cranbrook Sunday, February 27, beginning with a celebration of the Holy Communion in St. Paul's Chapel at 8:30 a.m. and followed by the Lenten Service at 9:30 a.m. and a special Lenten Service at 11 a.m.

The Rt. Rev. Herman Riddle, bishop of the Diocese of Northern Michigan, will be the guest preacher at the 9:30 and 11:00 o'clock services. His father, the late Herman Page, bishop of the Diocese of Michigan, officiated at the consecration of Christ Church Cranbrook. Herman Riddle Page was a major in the Chaplain Corps in the last war, and in this war was in charge of the Army and Navy Chaplain Training Schools at Fort Knox and then at Harvard. He was called from Harvard to his present post as Bishop of Northern Michigan in Marquette, Michigan.

Lenten Prelude, by Douglas, will be played by Arnold Bourzail at the 11:00 o'clock Lenten Service. The offertory anthem, "The Church under the direction of Dr. W. Lloyd Kemp is to be "When Christ a Child Was."

always near. To human sense, the so-called chips of state may seem to strike troubled waters. "Be not afraid, only believe," said the greatest healer, minister, and statesman of all times. Not to be afraid, but to love, understand, and use the Science of the Christ! Would not the result be the same as it was with Jesus—a complete dominion over evil, with a victory that is beneficial to all humankind?

The followers of Mary Baker Eddy fully subscribe to the teachings of the Master, and to the religious Tenets of the Christian Science organization. In accordance with the last of these Tenets (Science and Health, p. 497), we solemnly promise to watch, and pray for that Mind to be in us which was also in Christ Jesus; to do unto others as we would have them do unto us; and to be merciful, just, and pure.

The king of a great country recently chose as a benediction for his people, at an hour of apprehension and travail, the words of a poet: "I said to a man who stood at the gate of the years: 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown,' and he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than a light and safer than a known way." To these beautiful words, I add one of Mrs. Eddy's reflections in it (Retrospection and Inspiration, p. 92): "May we unloose the latches of his promise, inherit his legacy of love, and reach the fruition of his promise: 'If ye abide in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you.'"

## SOME MIXTURE!

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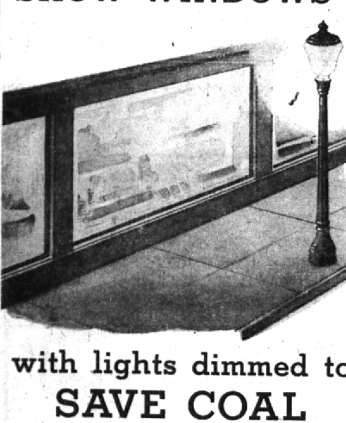
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## These are patriotic SHOW WINDOWS—
