This panel, made up of important State figures, sketched a pretty good series of plans, touching on the problems of unemployment, returned veterans, education, highways, conservation, etc. A splendid bit of foresight was evident at that meeting—except, of course, for the all-important problem of "where do we get the modey to carry these plans out?" Most certainly, Governor Kelly and his aides believe that there should be no resumption of pre-war New Deal crasy-quilt WPA ideas; each of them believes that each State should finance its own projects, not depending upon an inept political "Santa Claus" in Washington.

Our own notion, then, would be for each State to use its own credit by bonding for a majority of funds required for post-war problems. This would retain "State's rights" ideas, and ought to gesult in more efficient, economical carrying out of the projects.

Thus, when the war is over, and the inevitable hysteria sweeps over the nation, every State polsh will rush to Washington for a hand-out; then, of course, Santa Claus will put on his whiskers again, whether he be Democratic, New Dealish, or Republican.
