

Jan. 31 Is Deadline For Enlistment in V-5 Naval Program

Senior high school men, 17 and 18 years old, who will graduate before March 1, still have the chance to enlist in the Naval Aviation officers' training program under the winter quota.

January 31 is the deadline. Full information about V-5 Naval Aviation—may be obtained at the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board, ninth floor, Book building, Detroit.

Seniors who join V-5 are sent by the Navy to college for two full semesters following graduation from high school. Credits earned in this course will be accepted by any college or university toward meeting the requirements for a bachelor's degree. All the expenses of these men are paid by the Navy and these college trainees receive \$50 per month of addition.

Following the college training, these men begin a flight training course, during which they get 875 pay month as aviation cadets. Upon successful completion of flight training, they are given Navy wings and commissions as ensigns and Second Lieutenants, receiving \$291 per month in pay and allowances.

The Navy spends approximately \$30,000 to train each of its fliers. Lieutenant Creighton pointed out in urging eligible young men to join V-5 now while they still can.
