Sports Showup

As this column goes to press the Maple eagles' record this season is four wins and one defeat. This we believe is a fine record for our new coach Lloyd A. Cooper and his team to have established, especially when only one regular from last year was on the squad first of the season.

When the Maples suffered their first defeat of the season at the hands of the Hazel Park five 43-22, the Parkers were playing their opening game of the season. This was hardly evident, however, for they performed like seasoned veterans. The locals will have another crack at the Parkers on Feb. 22.

We are proud of the fine record Coach Cooper and his team have maintained so far this season, but we are not so proud of the unsportsmanlike conduct of the spectators toward the decisions of the officials. A little good natured chiding on the part of the spectators is expected by the officials, but the conduct at the last two home games is not that of former Birmingham basketball fans. Enthusiasm is one thing; rowdiness is an entirely different thing.

The visiting team, as well as our own, should receive the courtesy of silence when attempting foul shots. This courtesy has been afforded our opponents this season, but we hope that in the remaining games the spectators will show this and other courtesies of sportsmanlike conduct, expected of them. Remember, too, that the officials are entirely within their rights and rules to call a foul on the home team. More than one game has been won by the slim margin of only one point.

In their encounter with Hazel Park the Maples seemed to have a hard time getting started, allowing the Parkers to take an early lead. Don Little, speedy Maple forward, partly recovered, however, capturing 12 points, thereby capturing the scoring honors for the game.

Weldon MacDonald, who played for a short time at the center position for the locals against Hazel Park, did an admirable job of ball handling. We believe that his height, speed, and accurate passing make him a fine candidate for that position.

So far this season, the Maples have not been able to overcome their over-aggressive tactics. This led in last Friday night's contest to Harold Kelley and Mel Boomer, two of Baldwin's starting five, being removed from the game on personal.

A change has been made in the basketball schedule. Henry Ford Trade School will play Baldwin in the Baldwin gym both times, instead of one game away, as previously planned. Henry Ford draws its student body from scattered parts of this area and encourages attendance at home games is so small that they have discontinued them for the duration.

Baldwin High Has 2 Exciting Games During Next Week

During the next week Baldwin gym will be the scene of two fast, exciting basketball games as the Maple eagles take on Henry Ford Trade School tomorrow night and Ypsilanti Tuesday night.

Thus far this season the Maples have compiled a record of four wins and one loss. This does not include the Royal Oak game last Tuesday which had not been played when this article was written.

Ypsilanti Tuesday night, Harold Kelley, Melvin Boomer and Don Little, speedy Maple forward, stood out in the last quarter and was high point man of the game with 12 markers.

C. J. Ross sparked the Hazel Park attack with 11 points, closely followed by Pavloff with ten, Harold Kelley, Melvin Boomer and Don Little, speedy Maple forward, who has accounted for 49 of his team's points.
