CHURCH GROUP TO MEET
 CHICAGO—Religious education leaders of 42 Protestant denominations in the United States and Canada will face problems confronting the Church in planning for the post-war world at the 22nd annual meeting of the International Council of Religious Education, to be held in the Stevens Hotel here, Feb. 7 to 12, it has been announced by the Rev. Dr. Roy G. Ross, general secretary of the Council.
 From 1,200 to 1,500 lay and ministerial religious educators from every state and province will meet in general sessions and 17 advisory sections to consider the theme, "Christian Education for the Post-War World."
