

Civil Service In Need of Women Air Force Inspectors

Postmaster Joseph A. Byrne has just received word that women applicants will be received by the United States Civil Service Commission, Room 322, Federal Building, Detroit, during the month of January for positions as Army Air Force Inspectors at a salary of \$164.00 per month for a 46-hour week.

Applicants selected will be trained for 8 weeks at a government school located at Memphis, Tennessee, and will then return to a duty station in the Detroit Area. The only qualifications are that the applicant be a high school graduate and at least 18 years of age.

Men not subject to the draft are also eligible, but persons now engaged in war work should not apply.

LANSING—At the first sales of state-owned land this year, 23,000 acres and 2,054 platted lots in fourteen northern peninsula counties will be offered for sale. The lands put on the sale block by the lands division of the conservation department are being applied for by interested persons or recommended for sale by local municipal officials.
