**Used Goods Sellers Warned of Price Rule**  
Mrs. Rosalie Aspinall, new price clerk at the Birmingham Rationing Board, would like to call the attention of the public to the OPA rule on ceiling prices of used articles.  
Individuals offering used goods for sale probably are not familiar with the situation and maybe violating the regulation unintentionally. On certain used articles, such as mechanical refrigerators, typewriters, vacuum cleaners, washing machines and metal bed springs, there is a fixed price, which may be obtained by calling the Price Section of the Rationing Board and giving a description of the article.  
Individual letters are being sent to sellers in an effort to prevent individuals from violating the Durable Goods Law.


