Will Porcupines Timber Be Lost?

Ironwood, Michigan, Jan. 5.—The country's last remaining stand of original hardwood timber is marked for slaughter, unless the State of Michigan intervenes.

This is the warning by Raymond Dick, secretary of the Save the Porcupine Mountains Association, Ironwood. "The timber, without a parallel in America, is in private hands, and it is being logged," he said. "Operations are headed for the famous Lakes of the Clouds, an outstanding scenic wonder well known to many Birmingham and Oakland county residents who have visited the Porcupine Mountain region on their summer vacations, or have hunted and fished in the vicinity.

"Conservationists and nature lovers everywhere hope that the State will take over at least a part of this tract," continued Dick. "It could be administered by the Conservation Department as a great primeval forest, the home of a wide deer, bear, beaver and other wildlife population. It would make a unique scenic and recreation spot for the people of Michigan and their summer and winter guests."

The Michigan Conservation Commission, State Planning Commission, Michigan United Conservation Clubs, Upper Peninsula Development Bureau and many other organizations are backing the proposal for State purchase. It is expected that the project for the transfer of several thousand acres of the best of the timber will come up at the February session of the Legislature in Lansing.

Dick said that conservationists everywhere are rallying to the rescue of this aboriginal timber stand, but that a united effort will be necessary if it is to be saved from despoliation.

To War Dept.

DETROIT, Jan. 5.—W. Calvin Patterson, assistant to President in charge of public relations for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, has been named to the Moral Services Division of the War Department to act as assistant to Major General Frederick H. Osborn, director, according to an announcement by George M. Welch, president of the company.

The Moral Services Division is responsible for the planning and supervision of matters relating to the maintenance and improvement of morale within U. S. Army Forces throughout the world in accomplishing its mission, it operates information services to acquaint military personnel with the background, causes and current developments of the war. Army newspapers, films, news, radio and news services are used in this global operation. The division also conducts the Army Orientation Course and educational programs for troops, consisting of correspondence and self-study courses, educational films, exhibits, lectures and group instruction.

C. W. Hungerford, general advertising manager for Michigan Bell, will assume Mr. Patterson's duties, as acting assistant to president in addition to his regular advertising activities, during Patterson's absence.

Patterson, a native of College Park, Md., joined the advertising staff of Michigan Bell in 1927, following graduation from the University of Michigan with the Bachelor of Arts degree.

He was appointed general sales manager for the company in 1930, Southern division, commercial manager, with headquarters at the Grand Rapids and supervision over the business affairs of the company in the southern part of the Michigan in 1938, and was named assistant to president in June, 1940.
