**Title of Ordinance**  
AN ORDINANCE, providing for Con-  
sumers Power Company, its successors  
and assigns, the right, power and author-  
ity to lay, maintain and operate gas  
mains, pipes, conduits, etc., along  
across and under the public highways,  
streets, alleys, public places, and  
to do a local gas business in the  
TOWNSHIP OF OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a  
period of thirty years.

**Rights Granted**  
Section 1. The Township of Bloom-  
field, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby  
grants to the Consumers Power Com-  
pany, a corporation authorized to trans-  
act business in Michigan, its successors  
and assigns, hereinafter called the  
Grantee, the right, power and authority  
to lay and maintain and operate gas  
mains, pipes and conduits, etc., along,  
across and under the public highways,  
streets, alleys, bridges and other public  
places, and to do a local gas business in  
the Township of Bloomfield, Oakland  
County, Michigan, for a period of thirty  
years.

**Obligations of Grantee**  
Section 2. In consideration of the  
right, power and authority hereby granted  
all of which shall vest in the Grantee  
for a period of thirty (30) years, as  
aforesaid, said Grantee shall faithfully  
perform all things required by the terms  
hereof.

**Obstruction of Streets**  
Section 3. No street, alley, bridge,  
highway or other public place used by  
said Grantee shall be obstructed longer  
than necessary during the work of con-  
struction or repair, and shall be restored  
to the same order and condition as when  
said work was commenced.  
Section 4. Said Grantee shall be re-  
sponsible for the cost of any damage to  
the Township and shall be liable for the  
cost of making such repairs and pro-  
viding such service.

**Rate**  
Section 5. Said Grantee shall be en-  
titled to charge the inhabitants of said  
Township for gas furnished therein, the  
rate to be fixed by the Michigan Public  
Service Commission, to which Com-  
mission the Grantee shall apply, pending  
the time when the amount of gas to be  
furnished thereby shall provide an ad-  
equate and reasonable return upon the  
net cost of making such repairs and pro-  
viding such service.

**Acceptance**  
Section 6. The right, power and  
authority herein granted are not ex-  
clusive, either in kind or nature, and  
may be furnished hereunder.

**Extension**  
Section 7. Said Grantee shall from time  
to time extend its gas distribution system  
to and within said Township, and shall  
furnish gas to all applicants residing there-  
in whenever the amount of gas to be  
furnished thereby will provide an ad-  
equate and reasonable return upon the  
net cost of making such repairs and pro-  
viding such service.

**Confirmation by Vote**  
Section 8. This ordinance shall cease  
and be of no effect after thirty days from  
the date of its adoption unless the same  
shall have been approved by the Michi-  
gan Public Service Commission, to  
which Commission the Grantee shall apply,  
pending the time when the amount of gas  
to be furnished thereby will provide an  
adequate and reasonable return upon the  
net cost of making such repairs and pro-  
viding such service.

The foregoing ordinance was duly  
adopted by the Township Board of  
Oakland County, Michigan, on the 19th day  
of July 1944 by the following vote: Yes
