The young people were there in numbers, from all the Birmingham clubs, solo delegates from other towns at what a day it was for them. They were made welcome by the Junior League Club, then the music making meeting came to order and reports were dispensed with in a most gratifying manner.

The first winner in 1940 was David Smith, pianist, of Cincinnati. This year \$1,500 has been paid out in annual scholarships of \$250 each.
