**Graduation at M. S. To Be On June 10**

Six-hundred and forty-one men and women will be eligible to participate in Michigan State College's third wartime commencement exercises at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, June 10, in the college auditorium, Dr. John A. Linnah, president announced today. They represent 62 Michigan counties and 17 other states.

This group includes the 230 who received their degrees in the fall and winter quarters, 279 who plan to complete the requirements for graduation by June 10, and 132 who expect to finish their degree work by the end of the summer quarter, September 1. Although the summer quarter candidates will not receive their degrees on June 10, they may take part in commencement activities because at no other time in the year does Michigan State college hold graduating exercises.
