Plans Completed for 13th Annual Tag Day Sale, July 1

Plans are completed for the 13th Annual Oakland County Tag Day sponsored by the Auxiliary of St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital of Pontiac. This year Tag Day is July 1 in Birmingham and June 24 in Pontiac.

With the Tag Day Fund this year 60 baby beds, three modern incubators, fully equipped, used to save the lives of premature and delicate babies, have been purchased. The latest type operating table, costing over \$1,000 has been installed. Over 400 pairs of glasses have been given to those with defective eyesight who otherwise would never have received them, besides several thousand cases have been given medical attention; three \$1,000 War Bonds have been bought to form a nucleus for a post-war fund to be used in the future, if we encounter another depression or serious emergency cases.

Prior to this year the Tag Day fund gave one of the latest and most necessary gifts—a resuscitator used primarily to save the lives of new-born babies; the Hubbard tanks used for treatment in infantile paralysis; the shock-proof X-ray machine and the deep-seated tumor and cancer; the equipment in the hydrotherapy and physiotherapy rooms. Every piece of equipment is used for the paying and non-paying patients alike.
