Judge Earl Nash Outlines Stand

Municipal Judge Earl N. Nash of Ferndale, became a candidate for the Republican nomination for

Nash, a graduate of Valparaiso University, received his degree in law from the Detroit College of Law in 1919 and thereafter opened his law office in Ferndale with Calvin H. Smith, later becoming the third member of the firm of Smith, Nash and Pence.

He has been municipal judge of the city of Ferndale for 11 years and before becoming judge was associate justice for four years and served five years on the county board of supervisors.

His statement regarding the office he seeks follows:

"As prosecuting attorney, I will give my entire energy to the performance of the exacting duties of this office. I will actually work in the preparation and trial of cases and in harmony with my aids.

"I will give to the office of prosecuting attorney and to every major, city attorney, peace officer, the law enforcement agency throughout Oakland county, every decent measure of cooperation.

"I will perform my duties without prejudice against any person or group of persons. I believe in hard work, constant efforts, and in getting results. I will be a prosecutor, not a persecutor or a policeman.

"I will give to those who are employed, the same consideration and treatment that I will accord to those who employ.

"I hold high hope for the youth of my country. I will give to them and to the solution of their problems all my heart and energy. I will combat the cause of and hasten the remedy for juvenile delinquency.

"I will give to my country, and to the quarter of a million people within my country, the experience, judgment and ability that I have acquired in the 25 years of successful legal practice.
