Home Nursing Classes Being Enrolled At Pontiac By Red Cross

Six lessons in the care of the sick is the plan for classes now being enrolled in Pontiac according to Mrs. Hugh Little, chairman of the home nursing service of Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross. Classes will open the week of June 26. Mrs. Avis Green, director of home nursing, who will instruct the classes recently returned from Grand Rapids where she attended a conference of selected nurses who will teach the course in the state.

The classes will be open at Pontiac General Hospital. One class will meet Tuesday and Thursday at 1:30 p. m. and the other Wednesday and Friday at the same hour. The course will include essential nursing procedures taken from the standard course in Red Cross home nursing. Each class will be limited to ten members and any person wishing to enroll may register at Chapter headquarters, Pontiac 3-8393. Those who complete the course will receive Red Cross certificates.
