

Noted Educator Challenges Secondary Schools To Produce Community Leaders

Secondary schools have not been distinguished for the production of community leaders, according to Dr. Howard V. McClusky, professor of educational psychology and assistant to the vice-president, University of Michigan, in an article appearing in the current Cranbrook Bulletin.

Unless this failure is repaired, society will have a right to question the effectiveness of secondary learning and demand a re-examination of its purposes and programs.

Dr. McClusky, who is director of Kingswood School Cranbrook, points to the universal trend toward the centralization of political and economic power.

"Another trend of our times, equally striking and equally significant, is the growing differentiation of society. Practically every department of life is becoming more and more characterized by specialization and a correlative interdependence. The more we concentrate on one phase of living, the more we divert attention from other phases of living and increase our dependence on the services of specialists from whose province our attention has been withdrawn.

The specialization which produces interdependence cuts off the specialist from that breadth of experience required for understanding and management of an interdependent society, according to Dr. McClusky. It is this important breadth of experience and understanding which should be required in the secondary schools.

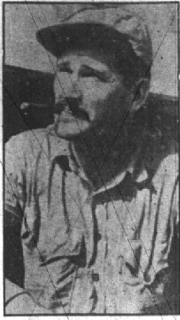
"As one measure it is suggested that experience in face to face community situations be provided as a prerequisite to graduation. Students might be interested to various types of agencies and organizations such as churches, libraries, labor, business, and farm groups, departments of public health and welfare, councils of youth, recreation, adult education and other community programs. The information in community affairs is not the only vehicle of education for leadership but is an enriching supplement of collateral experiences on the campus."

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been an Oakland County Circuit Court clerk, a general practitioner of law, a legal advisor to the Oakland County Treasurer, and the last five years he has spent in the Oakland County Prosecutor's office as chief assistant. The fact that Mr. Noggle was chosen by the unanimous vote of the Circuit Judges of this County to fill the vacancy due to the death of his predecessor speaks well of his qualifications. He is a member of the All Saints Episcopal Church of Pontiac, the B.P.O.E., the Eagles, the Moose and the Pontiac Exchange Club.

Dr. John Wood Going To Osteopathic Ass'n War Service Meeting

CHICAGO, Ill.—Dr. John F. Wood of Birmingham, Mich., is scheduled to take an official part in the War Service Conference and 48th annual meeting of the American Osteopathic Association to be held in Chicago July 14 to 18, it was announced today.

Dr. Wood is a member of the Board of Trustees and chairman of the Bureau of Osteopathic Legislation which will meet during the conference.

The various sessions of the conference will be centered upon vital war and postwar health problems.

Approximately 2,357,000 men are serving with the U. S. Army Air Forces, of whom fewer than one-half are already overseas.

Enrollment At Cranbrook Sets New High Record

The largest attendance in the history of the Cranbrook summer school sessions was announced on Monday, registration day, at the Cranbrook Academy of Art, Cranbrook School and Kingswood School Cranbrook.

The Cranbrook Institute of Science Museum of Natural Sciences and the Cranbrook Academy of Art Museum also report increased attendance over any similar period since the beginning of the war.

Cranbrook Summer School of the Theatre, which is part of the Cranbrook summer program, also has broken all records for enrollment according to Carl Womberg, director.

Jonah, Cranbrook's outdoor swimming pool, leads in record breaking attendances by gathering patrons from all of the Cranbrook institutions.

PROTECT GAME BIRD

An additional five-year period of grace has been extended to the Hungarian partridge now present in Michigan by conservation commission action in prohibiting the taking of the exotic species before October 1, 1949. Present protection dates from 1941. Sportsmen and farmers, questioned last spring, thought there had been little change or perhaps a slight decrease in numbers of hunks during the last year.

New Public Park Is Bought On Lk. Huron

LANSING—Purchase of 1,000 feet of Lake Huron frontage is to complete state ownership in the Port Huron state park area between US25 and the lake. The conservation commission has approved the \$25,000 purchase.

The commission also has approved the purchase of 230 acres for recreational development on Pittman-Robertson property in Kalamazoo County, and 100-acre tract in Barry County, and 1,500 feet of frontage on the Jordan river in Azzim County, and 4,500 feet of frontage on Payne lake in Barry County.

Largest new acquisition will be 6,337 acres to be added to Pigeon River and Presque Isle state forests in Otsego and Montmorency counties at an option price of \$25,744.

The AAF has more than 20 heavy bombardment, medium bombardment, light and reconnaissance groups, of which almost all are committed to action overseas and to continental America.

The number of U. S. soldiers overseas is still increasing to more than 6,000,000 by the end of 1944. One year ago, 1,500,000 men were overseas.

Mr. Noggle pledges to the public that he will continue in office under obligation to no group or individual and will be free from any type of pressure from any quarter. He believes that the office of Prosecutor should be devoted to a conscientious, careful law enforcement program and to that end he is prepared to do his duty.

Mr. Noggle further stated that the office of Prosecutor should be open to returning veterans who are equipped and legal advice on problems affecting the law enforcement program of the County and he assures the public that he will do all within his power as Prosecutor to facilitate the re-acceptance of returned veterans into normal civilian life.

"During my five years as chief assistant prosecutor," Mr. Noggle said, "I have been disturbed by an increase in the number of juvenile crimes. While under the law the office of Prosecutor is somewhat limited in the handling of juvenile matters, nevertheless, I believe that an intelligent understanding and study of youth problems is an essential part of my duty. I propose that during the next two years, if I am retained, to instruct my staff to study carefully the social and economic problems which give rise to juvenile delinquency and to do all in our power to co-operate with juvenile authorities toward bringing about a rehabilitation of youth rather than an ill-considered prosecution. The public may be sure that if I am retained in this important office that Oakland County will never be a haven for gamblers and other criminals and that the prosecution of law-breakers will be relentless and conclusive."
