Nursing School Open To Girls Of This Region

The School of Nursing of the St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, is participating in the nurse education plan under which members of the United States Marine Corps are enrolled. Miss Martha Johnson, R. N., chairman of the student nursing committee of the Oakland county council for war service, announced today. "The girls from this area who can qualify as cadet nurses, may apply to the St. Joseph's School of Nursing, which is approved by the division of nurse education of the U. S. Public Health Service. Sister Emmanuel is superintendent of nurses and will interview prospective students. Minimum requirements for membership in the Corps are graduation with good scholastic record from an accredited high school, and in good health. The age is from 18 to 30.

These young women are being prepared to meet the acute needs for nursing service. All-expense scholarships, provided by the U. S. Public Health Service enable them to complete their entire nurse education at no financial cost to themselves. "You are serving your own community as well as your country by preparing for one of the noblest of all professions," Miss Johnson said today. Cadet nurses pledge themselves to remain in essential nursing throughout the war. The field of nursing in which they will serve is left to their own choice. Cadet nurses enrolled in schools of nursing participating in the U. S. cadet nurse program will receive full nurse education in thirty-six months. Upon graduation they will be eligible to apply for state registration and to become registered nurses.
