

Annual Competition For Scholarships At Cranbrook On April 7

Cranbrook School of Bloomfield Hills, has announced its ninth annual competition for scholarships available to boys who will be ready to enter the 7th to 11th grades inclusive, in September of this year.

Boys wishing to enter the competition must send a letter to the registrar of the school requesting that his name be enrolled on the list of candidates. This letter must be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from the boy's present school principal and must reach Cranbrook School not later than April 7.

Boys who are accepted as candidates will be required to take prescribed examinations at Cranbrook School or under the supervision of a local teacher recommended by the principal. Examinations will be held on Saturday, April 16, according to Earl Friedrich, Registrar.

In addition to the results of the tests, the following factors will be taken into consideration in granting the Honor Awards: 1. Previous school record; 2. Character and leadership; 3. Special cultural abilities; 4. Health and athletic ability; 5. Need of financial assistance.

Baldwin Library Offers Three Fine Books About India

For some, the word "India" conjures up a nice clear picture of a large section of Asia, with well rounded ideas as to races, politics, climate, exports and imports. The following is not for them.

For others the picture is pretty vague—merely a sort of gray fog broken here and there by hazy vignettes of an elderly gentleman in three cornered pants. Untouchables, mesmerized snakes and the rope trick.

For members of the latter fraternity, who have been beating paths to library doors asking for information on India, there are three new books on the country at Baldwin Public Library.

This is India, by Peter Muir. Written by an American who arrived in Calcutta just before Pearl Harbor, this is a general look at the country. The author found out much about the people, their way of doing things and why, particularly why they act about the country itself and its effect on its inhabitants and history. This is also a good deal of light on some of the most tangled political act in the world.

India's Problem Can Be Solved by DeWitt MacKenzie. Less per-

sonal that the foregoing, this is an intense approach to the political problems of the country and her role in Asiatic and World affairs.

India Against the Storm, by Post Wheeler. A study of the Indian political picture of the last 25 years, with due weighting of Indian and British points of view. Much first hand material on Gandhi, Nehru and other leaders.

As far as politics are concerned, here is a book to cast some light on some of the foggy bits of political history on the home front.

American Political Parties, by Wilfred Binkley. "The natural history of the parties," the origin and growth. Particularly interesting is the author's concern with the kinds of leaders produced by party politics.

Books for lighter moments: "Dancing Saints," by George Leslie. Novel of conflicting personalities against a background of a decaying Shaker community. An unusual bit of Americana and a good story.

Now I Lay Me Down to Sleep, by Howard DeWitt. The irresistible Mr. Benjamin's first novel.

Journey into the Fog, by Cornelia Goddard. The tragic story of the discovery of the Bering sea.

Invitation to Murder, by Ione Shiber. Murder at a dinner party.

Good Night, Ladies, by Van Siler. The picture of what a Washington almost seals the show in this one.

Who Killed the Doctor? by Miles Barton. Scotland Yard investigated a village where doctors have the habit of getting murdered.

M. and 5:00 P. M., except that on TUESDAY, MARCH 14, the Clerk's Office will be open from 8:00 A. M. to 8:00 P. M.

Those persons who have already registered under the permanent registration system, and have voted at least once during the last two years do not have to re-register.
