MOMS Club Women Doing Much For Men Now In U.S. Service

Of all the activities of the MOMS club, perhaps the one which gives the participants the most satisfaction is sewing at the State fair grounds for the military police stationed there. It is probably because every mother who goes down there to work hopes deep in her heart that some one might do the same for her boy whether he be stationed in this country or in some foreign land. At least she feels that she is doing for a stranger what her fingers have itched to do for her boy.

Started as a club project last July, more than 50 members of the local unit have mended, altered or generally renovated more than 1,000 garments for the boys. These include the heavy winter overcoats, 42 of which have been repaired to date; 59 field jackets; 29 blouses, more than 100 shirts, trousers, fatigue pants, which are often more hole than pants; hats, socks, mittens and always more insignia to sew on as the boys progress.

Not satisfied with giving one day a week to this work, the MOMS are also knitting sweaters for the boys. Each Thursday morning when the MOMS arrive, the boys look at the list of sweater requests to see how far their names are from the top anxious to know when their turns will come. Each sweater is knitted for the individual. It is not G. I. and the pride of possession is strong in the proud owners. More knits will be needed, it is said, as soon as yarn is available.
