

Government Calls In 7 Bond Issues

Attention is being called by government and bank officials to seven government issues which are being called in at the present time and to new issues for which they may be exchanged. The called issues are 3 1/2 per cent treasury bonds 1944-d due April 15, 1944; one per cent treasury notes due March 15; 3 1/2 per cent treasury notes due June 15; 3 1/2 per cent Federal Farm Mortgage corporation due March 15; 3 per cent Home Owners Loan corporation 1944-52 due May 1; one per cent Reconstruction Finance notes due April 15.

They may be exchanged for 2 1/2 per cent treasury bonds 1965-70; 2 1/2 per cent treasury bonds 1956-9, identical to issues offered in the recent war bond campaign; and 1 1/2 per cent treasury notes due Sept. 15, 1948.

The offer opened March 2 and closes at the discretion of the secretary of the treasury.

Onions and Cabbage Less Odorous When Cooked More Slowly

Those smelly vegetables that belong to the sulphur family give off fewer odors in the kitchen if the cook knows proper cooking methods.

Onions, cabbage and turnips often appear on a family's temporary blacklist because cooking odors saturate the air and trigger allergies. Tests indicate the cook is at fault for much of the trouble, since gentle cooking until the vegetables are just tender makes the vegetables give off less odor and puts more food value on the table.

Approved cooking consists of covering the vegetables with water, cooking gently in an uncovered kettle until just tender.

Smoking fat offers another guide in cooking. Food specialists advise cooks that when fat smokes it is too hot. The fat breaks down chemically and the food cooked in over-fat may cause discomfort for those who eat the food.
