The Marianas---Closer and Closer to Tokyo We Go

Your RED CROSS is at his side

The Marianas (Mariane) Islands are one of our newest points of attack against the Japs in the Pacific. At top you see a group of Marianas natives watching their fellows hew out a log canoe, second only to pedal power. At lower right the blimp houses of Garapan village on Saipan Island, a prosperous Jap settlement attacked recently by our carrier-based torpedo planes and dive bombers along with Tinian Island. Sugar is a chief product here. The map shows the location of the group, a fortification barring the road to victory some 1300 miles south of Tokyo. They are named after Maria Ana, 17th century Austrian queen of Spain. There are 47 principal islands; Guam, the largest, came to the U. S. by treaty resulting from the Spanish-American War, and in 1899 Spain sold the rest to Germany. Japan got them by mandate after World War I. (Navy photos.)
