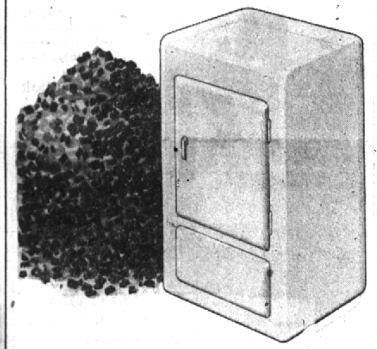

Be firm in establishing new habits of going to bed. Decide upon a routine, including your pre-bedtime activities, and stick to it. Little out-of-routine excursions are what keep you tossing fitfully on your pillow.

Don't plan to turn in right after work or right after whatever-it-is meal you've had. To de-kill mind and nerves, prepare for sleep with some kind of relaxing exercise. A good time to take your daily-dose of your way home from work. You can get it by dropping in at a gym, by ducking into a bowling alley, or by using your feet instead of a bus or trolley to get yourself home.

All set to sleep? If somebody's radio lets out a blast or somebody's children whoop it all playing Indian, you can blot it all out with ear stoppers of malleable pink wax which are available in different types of pellets for varying degrees of sound proofing.
