Hills Commission Honors L. D. Allen

The city commission of Bloomfield Hills at its May meeting Tuesday evening honored Luther D. Allen, long time commission member and village president and mayor. The commission members presented him with a parchment on which was sketched a copy of a recent resolution of the commission which read as follows:

WHEREAS, Luther D. Allen has served the Village and City of Bloomfield Hills continuously for the past eighteen years, having been chairman of the Village Charter Commission in 1926, president of the Village from 1927 to 1932 inclusive—member of the City Commission 1933 to 1943 inclusive, being elected Mayor in 1937 and 1938, and during this period of service has attended every regular meeting of the Village and City Commissions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that on behalf of the officials and residents of the City the Commissioners of the City of Bloomfield Hills express to Luther D. Allen their sincere appreciation of the long and faithful service rendered by him and for his valuable contribution to the government and general welfare of the City Community.

In addition the commission instructed the city clerk to send Mr. Allen a notice of all future meetings of the commission and expressed the hope he would find time to attend many more meetings.

Tuesday evening the commission adopted a proposed budget for the coming financial year. The new budget will total \$65,200, with \$39,540 listed on the tax budget and the remainder of the offset credit list of anticipated income.

Call Budget Hearing

The meeting was adjourned to May 23 when a public hearing on the budget is being arranged. Following this hearing the budget will be an for adoption and the work is expected to be completed at that session. Although the total budget is expected to be slightly larger than last year the credits are expected to be greater. The tax rate is expected to be raised slightly. An item included this year is \$1,000 for street oiling operations.

Another important item approved Tuesday night was a resolution directing the city attorney to draft an ordinance under which the city may adopt and operate a planning commission of nine members. It was suggested on this body he named the mayor, an administrative officer, commission member and six citizens.
