As witness the following paragraph of a letter from Cpl. Duane A. Meeker, 66th Medical Group, stationed at North Ireland, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Meeker, Wallace street:

"I am a Red Cross worker in our dispensary. I noticed our sponges were labeled by a Red Cross chapter. They was no county name given but you can see we are using the sponges some volunteer workers made. I wish in Birmingham to keep up the good work as dressings are needed. If we they have asked for more help; why don't more of the women in town help you out? We really use the dressings here. A single sponge may save a man's life but if they don't have it—well, we know the answer here."

Remember—housecleaning can wait if it must, until the war is won. Surgical dressings are needed now.

Saturday, May 20, has been selected as pre-registration date for all courses at the Kingswood Summer Institute, according to Miss Frances H. Basse, director.

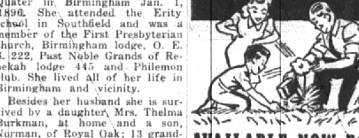

Ceiling Prices Revised by OPA

Office of Price Administration has announced maximum prices on fresh fruits and vegetables to be effective April 27 through May 4 in Oakland county.

Maximum prices established OPA will apply to all stores and are specifically provided for stores in groups 1 and 2. Retail stores in groups 3 and 4, OPA will calculate their selling prices to maximum price regulation and should generally reflect lower prices than the maximum established in the OPA order.

Decreases are shown in California and Arizona oranges and lemons and wax beans, carrots and potatoes. Increases are given for cauliflower and peas.
