Wayne Runs Wild To Defeat Maples; Win TVAA Title

With the best running attack seen yet this year Wayne high school football team trounced Birmingham to the tune of 47-0 on Wayne's field Friday afternoon, clinching the TVAA championship.

Wayne wasted little time in scoring, and before eight minutes of the first quarter were completed Norm Gomolak, Wayne fullback, plunged over from the one-yard line after a 60-yard march. The kick was left in the second period. Wayne added two more touchdowns. Norm Mason intercepted a Birmingham pass on the Maples' 21-yard line and scored. Mason's kick was good.

The next touchdown came on a fumble on the Birmingham 30. Carpenter recovered. Piscopink ran 23 yards to score. Mason again converted.

Birmingham's only scoring opportunity came in the third quarter when Crim blocked Piscopink's punt on the 23 yard stripe. After the Maples advanced the ball to the nine-yard line on two short runs by McMahon and an eight yard dash by York, the Wayne line held.

The best run of the game highlighted Wayne's next touchdown drive. With the ball on his own 20-yard line after Filkins had punted into the end zone, Piscopink took the pigskin 65 yards to the Birmingham 15. On the next play Lapella scampered for a touchdown and Mason again converted.

The Wayne team tallied three more times in the fourth period, two counters being set up by Birmingham's fumbles.
