PIE FOR THANKSGIVING... For tempting, mouth-watering goodness, our Home Service Department challenges you to beat this for Thanksgiving dinner:

Pumpkin Chiffon Pie

3 tsp. gelatin 1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 cup cold water 2 tbs. butter
1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin 1/4 cup milk
1 cup brown sugar 3 eggs, separated
2 tps. cinnamon 2 tps. granulated sugar
1/2 tsp. ginger 1 baked pastry shell
1/4 tsp. allspice

Soften gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Combine the next eight ingredients with slightly-beaten egg yolks and cook over hot heat until thickened. Add gelatin, and stir until dissolved. Cool until it begins to congeal. Beat egg whites, add sugar and beat until stiff. Fold into pumpkin mixture. Pour into baked pastry shell and chill until firm. Makes one (9-inch) pie.

Copies of Famous Mayflower Pact Presented Schools

Copies of the famous Compact of the Pilgrim Company, written and signed in the cabin of the Mayflower off the shores of Cape Cod in 1620 have been presented to the various Birmingham public schools.

The gifts were made possible through the efforts of William Howland, 500 Lakeside, whose Pilgrim ancestor, John Howland was one of the signers of the memorable document.

In the newest edition of the Howland Quarterly, a little booklet from the Howland association, is found this statement:

"In the cabin of the Mayflower, humanity recovered its rights. They believed in the equality of all men before God; therefore, without other precedent they made all men equal before the law. In so doing these men became the first Americans. Thus Americanism was born on these shores."

"This message that the Pilgrim brings to humanity is greater than any single time of the American past. The great obligation is on us, now, to set both the same devotion to principle and the same fidelity to duty. So may our nation stand forever as the mighty guardian of human liberty, of God's justice, of Christlike brotherhood."

The following suggestion comes from the Governor General of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants:

"This year, more than any other year since our Society came into being, Compact Day should be observed to generally and so impressively that no intelligent person in the United States can fail to realize the significance of the anniversary. Three centuries and twenty-three years after our ancestors wrote and signed the Compact, the country is engaged in all-out war to uphold the principles of that Declaration."

"Our armed forces, on land, on sea, and in the air, are fighting on far flung fronts over the whole world to make sure that all people have the right to 'inact, constitute and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions and officers'... as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good." The words of the Compact are the guiding rule of Democracy. Our Pilgrim ancestors wrote this.
