the members of the Guild.

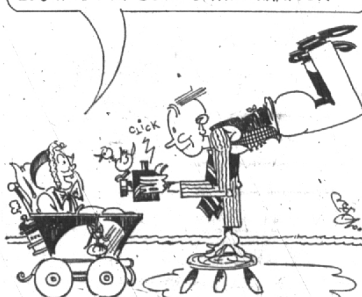
Mrs. Martha Murphy is the gen-
