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Draft Boards Tighten Permits To Farmers

Official instructions received by Oakland county draft boards make radical changes in the granting of permits to young farmers to work in defense plants during the winter. Boards are now practically prohibited from granting such requests.

The new directive, which also goes out to farm boards, states that the granting of such temporary changes of occupation were "too liberal" last year. It is now practically impossible for a farm employee between the ages of 18 and 25 at the time his request is considered to be allowed to make the change.

The farm board, through which such requests are cleared, states that no permits are available. If a man is not needed during the winter on the farm where he is regularly employed he may be transferred temporarily to another farm.

Dry, Warm Period Seems About Over

Birmingham's long stretch of dry, warm weather was broken by Friday night's shower and the sweep in of cool weather from the north.

The light rain was considered quite a blessing by the fire department which was again being plagued with numerous grass fires, leaf fires and fires in piles of rubbish here and there about the city and on the city's edges.

The October and early November records for warm days had been broken with temperatures as high as 73 recorded. The first three days of November set some kind of new warm records for Birmingham.

But for the wheat farmers of Oakland county the dry weather was a blessing. J. C. Borum, state crop statistician, says wheat planted in a dry fall does better than average. The shortage of moisture was reported general throughout the entire nation.
