

**RATIONING AT A GLANCE**

**Mens, Fats**—Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through K5, good indefinitely. No new stamps until Oct. 29.

**Processed Foods**—Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through R5, good indefinitely. No new stamps until Nov. 1.

**Sugar**—Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33, each good for five pounds, indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of cane sugar through February, next year.

**Gasoline**—In 17 East Coast states, A-11 coupons good for three gallons each through Nov. 8. In states outside the East Coast area, A-13 coupons in new "A" book, good for four gallons each through Dec. 31.

**Fuel Oil**—Period 4 and 5 coupons and new period 1 coupons, good throughout coming heating year.

**Shoes**—Airplane stamps 1 and 2, good indefinitely. New stamp good Nov. 1.

**Plentiful Food**—Onions.

**Overseas Christmas Package Mailing**—Oct. 15 last day.

**Lieut. Waggoner Tells of Work of Combat Air Missions Over France**

A 9th Air Force Thunderbolt Base, France: "I believe a pilot gets the most action when supporting the ground forces," said Lt. Robert E. Waggoner, Birmingham, Mich., fighter pilot in Lt. Col. Paul P. Douglas's Thunderbolt squadron which has been supporting American armored columns and ground troops advancing on Germany. The Lieutenant described combat missions he has flown.

"In my first mission a squadron of us went out to destroy a bridge. There was a lot of flak around the target. We dive bombed the bridge. I must have had beginners luck—the other pilots told me my bombs hit the bridge directly in the middle. I wasn't hit by flak either."

One day, at 5:01 p. m., a tool and die company producing equipment for B-29's sent an urgent call to the Edison Company reporting that its electric power was off and vital war production halted.

**5:03 P.M.**

**5:09 P.M.**

In one minute a Detroit Edison job dispatcher had contacted the emergency crew of truck 23—at that time in the vicinity of the crippled plant—by short wave radio over our station WQJL.

**5:40 P.M.**

In six more minutes the skilled overhead lines crew of truck 23 was at work repairing the break in the system, so that war production could resume.

Truck 23—responding to the call of its short wave receiver—was speeding on its way toward the trouble even before the dispatcher finished giving complete details.

Just 39 minutes after Detroit Edison received the emergency call, power was restored and vital war work was moving again.

We are not always able to equal this record for speed. But by means of two-way FM (Frequency Modulation) radio, 49 Edison cars and trucks are always in touch with our central trouble switchboard, permitting emergency crews to be dispatched speedily to the scenes of major emergencies. We are constantly seeking new ways to improve our operation and give better service to our customers.
