Nearly all Birmingham Realtors were guests of the Edwin S. George Foundation for lunch at the Forest Hills Country Club Wednesday, Oct. 11. The purpose was to get a "hand picture" of Colonel George's Bloomfield Hills property, comprising the general area of Long Lake Island Lake and Forest Lake, most of which he has given for the establishment of the Edwin S. George Foundation.

This Foundation, established in 1935, directs that all of its funds will be devoted to charitable, religious and educational work, and for the building of a church and school in the heart of the property for the benefit of the district. One of its other main concerns is assistance given Boy Scout work.

Colonel George, in stating frankly his deep love for the beautiful property he controls, said he felt it only fitting to donate this natural beauty to the Foundation rather than selling it himself. For thirty-seven years he has enjoyed the beauty of the landscape and said "I like it in any kind of weather."

In response to agreements mailed out to owners of land used for victory gardens, permission has been received in most cases to use the land for gardens next year. Mrs. Charles D. McCall, in charge of the Victory Garden desk, said today it was necessary for the agreements also to be signed by the gardeners.

"Before we can assign plowmen to borrowed land, agreements must be signed by both user and owner," said Mrs. McCall. "This may be done by filling out the agreement printed elsewhere, or coming to the Victory Garden desk in the municipal building. The desk is open each day from 9 a. m. until noon. Those who want new plots of fall plowing should call 1270 and leave word of their needs."
