Resolved, that the Oakland County Council of Veterans do everything in its power to discourage any hilarious celebration or over-exuberance on the day that victory in Europe is announced, and be it further

Resolved, that we urge upon the people of Oakland county a vigorous continuance of all Home Front activities in the war effort with no relaxing until final victory is accomplished on all fronts. And be it further

Resolved, that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the newspapers of Oakland county for publication.

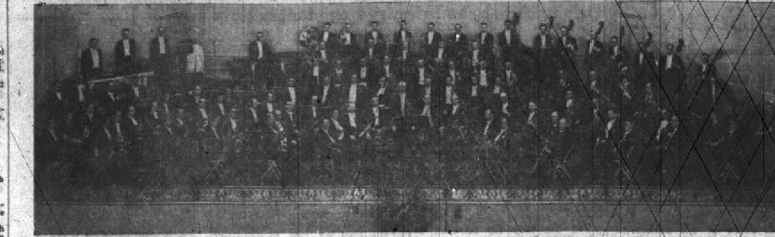

Detroit Symphony Orchestra Opens Fall And Winter Concert Season



The opening concert of the 1944-45 Season by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra was a complete triumph. Masonic Temple, with a capacity of 5,000, was filled to the rafters long before Karl Krueger lifted his baton to direct the orchestra of 110 men in the National Anthem. The ovations were heart-warming salutes to Karl Krueger who is beginning his second season as conductor of his magnificent body of musicians, as well as a tribute to the Detroit Symphony which is thirty years old this fall.

as thrilling fare as that of Oct. 12. Next Thursday Detroit will be privileged to hear the new Concertmaster, Josef Gingold, when he makes his appearance as the first soloist of the season. Mr. Gingold, who comes to this orchestra from the NBC Symphony, has enjoyed enormous success on this continent and in Europe as a soloist, chamber music performer, and as an orchestral musician of the New York highest calibre. His solo on Oct. 19 will be the Spanish Symphony for violin and orchestra by Lalo. The first concert in the Saturday series (20 programs to be played

by the Detroit Symphony—not "pop" concerts) will be the occasion of so many exciting happenings that one hardly knows where to begin telling. First, last, and only, Oct. 23, the Detroit Symphony as the "Voice of Detroit," Karl Krueger conducting will be carried on a coast-to-coast network by Mutual Broadcasting Company. Olga Downes, eminent music critic of the New York "Times" and noted lecturer on musical subjects, is to be the guest of Mr. Krueger and the orchestra, and he will speak briefly at the concert. The Saturday audience

will hear Josef Gingold in the Chausson "Poeme," the Brahms Symphony No. 1, and the Second Suite from Ravel's "Daphnis and Chloe." Reservations from New York, Chicago, Seattle and other places have been made for these concerts by people who want to see and hear the orchestra which has made magic strides in the one season that Karl Krueger, conductor, and Henry H. Reinhold, president of the Symphony's Board of Trustees, have combined hard work and great vision to attain these phenomenal results.

Warn Birmingham Auto Owners To Check Cars Now

Birmingham motorists are being warned by automobile executives and garage operators that they are entering their fourth winter

of wartime driving and may find themselves "careless" on the first cold day if they are careless in preparing for it. It is pointed out that the coming 1944-45 winter will be the most critical period of wartime transportation. The age of some cars and the hard use they have undergone with lack of proper care in some cases make thousands of them potential casualties.

One Birmingham garage owner pointed out today that service stations were able to handle only a small percentage of calls of Birmingham's stranded motorists on the first cold day of last winter. He points out that manpower problems are even worse this year.

The following steps are urged to prepare for winter driving: An engine tune-up will pay for itself in gasoline savings. Change to lighter oil and greases; have brakes, steering gear, wheel alignment and tires checked. Check hose connections, fan belts and thermostat and have radiator cleaned before antifreeze is added. Battery cables and wiring in old automobiles are almost certain to be slightly deteriorated. Old spark-plugs or carbon-hersted ones waste gasoline. Test battery. The lower the tem-

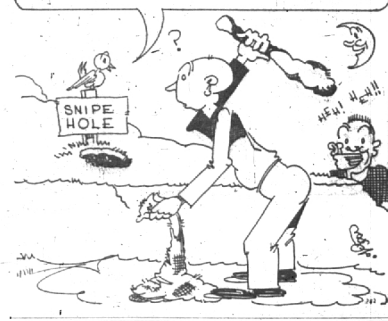
