World Community Day To Be Held Here On Nov. 3rd

The Birmingham Council of Church Women will join thousands of church women throughout the United States on November 3 in the observance of world community day, sponsored by the United Council of Church Women to enable all church women to unite in a day's study of their responsibility for a just and lasting peace.

The local observance, which is being planned by Council Church Women, will be held at St. James church at 10:30 p. m. Following a presentation of the program "The Price of Enduring Peace," the women will participate in a dedication service. More than 100,000 women in all parts of the United States participated in last year's observance and favored overwhelmingly participation in a world organization. Votes were tabulated and the results sent to Congressmen to indicate their thinking of church women in their constituencies.

Urging that truly interdenominational and interfaith programs be held in every community in the United States, Mrs. Ruth Mougey Worrell, executive secretary of the United Council of Church Women, says: "We have faith to believe that the women of this world, through prayer, study and action may determine the kind of a world we covet for our children and our children's children."

Representing 10,000,000 Protestant church women, the Council is effective only as church women unite in their local communities for study and action. World Community Day is one of three annual observances sponsored by the United Council of Church Women, the others being the World Day of Prayer and the May Fellowship observance.

Mrs. Earl Cunningham, president of the Birmingham council states that "all women, whether members of the Council or not, are earnestly urged to unite in this day's study of our responsibilities for a just and lasting peace and a new world order."

Michigan Apple-Salmon Salad

4 Michigan apples, diced with skins on
 2 cups (1 lb.) canned salmon, coarsely flaked
 1 1/2 cups diced celery
 1 cup chopped nuts
 French or mayonnaise dressing
 Dice the apples coarsely, without paring. Sprinkle with lemon juice to prevent darkening. Flake salmon (or tuna fish) and add apples, diced celery and chopped nuts. Season to taste, and add sufficient dressing to moisten thoroughly.
 Serve in a salad bowl lined with lettuce or endive. For luncheon parties, this salad makes a delicious main course, served with hot rolls and coffee.
