"Heating systems should be examined for cracks or other defects, soot, or clogging in chimneys and flues. Repairs should be made promptly. Make sure that no combustible material, including wood, is exposed to heat.

"Repairs in covered metal containers; shield fireplaces with screens.

"Replace weather-wood flammable wood shingle roofs with fire-resistant roofing.

"See that ample ash trays are available wherever smoking is permitted, and that careful smoking habits are cultivated by all members of the family.

"Put matches in metal containers, out of the reach of small children. Use flashlight for temporary illumination.

"The great care with any flammable liquid brought into the home for any purpose. Do not use flammable cleaning fluids. A correctly located fire means no serious damage.
