

### Legion Is To Back Training Program

Birmingham Legionnaires and their friends are interested greatly in the word that the American Legion is planning to push legislation for universal military training of American youths in peacetime.

This was reported by Edward N. Scheiberling, legion national commander, who conferred recently with President Roosevelt in connection with the organization's legislative program, which also calls for pensions for widows and orphans of all war veterans.

Scheiberling said Mr. Roosevelt "appeared to be sympathetic" to the Legion's proposals, although he made no commitments. The Legion has not yet drawn definite proposals for the final form of its peacetime military training program, Scheiberling said but specifies that every "qual-

ified young male" should be included at the peace table," he asserted.

He said he did not know how such a man or woman would be selected, but added that there was "no question but what Gen. Eisenhower would be a very good man."

### 16,000 Michigan Vets Are Placed In Jobs

More than 16,000 veterans of World War II have been re-employed in Michigan since Jan. 1 through USES, it was announced Saturday by Edward L. Cushman, state director of the War Manpower Commission.

Many other veterans obtained jobs directly without referral of USES under a provision, now adopted nationally, exempting them from employment regulations requiring such referral.

It is estimated that approximately 50,000 Michigan men have been released by the armed services.

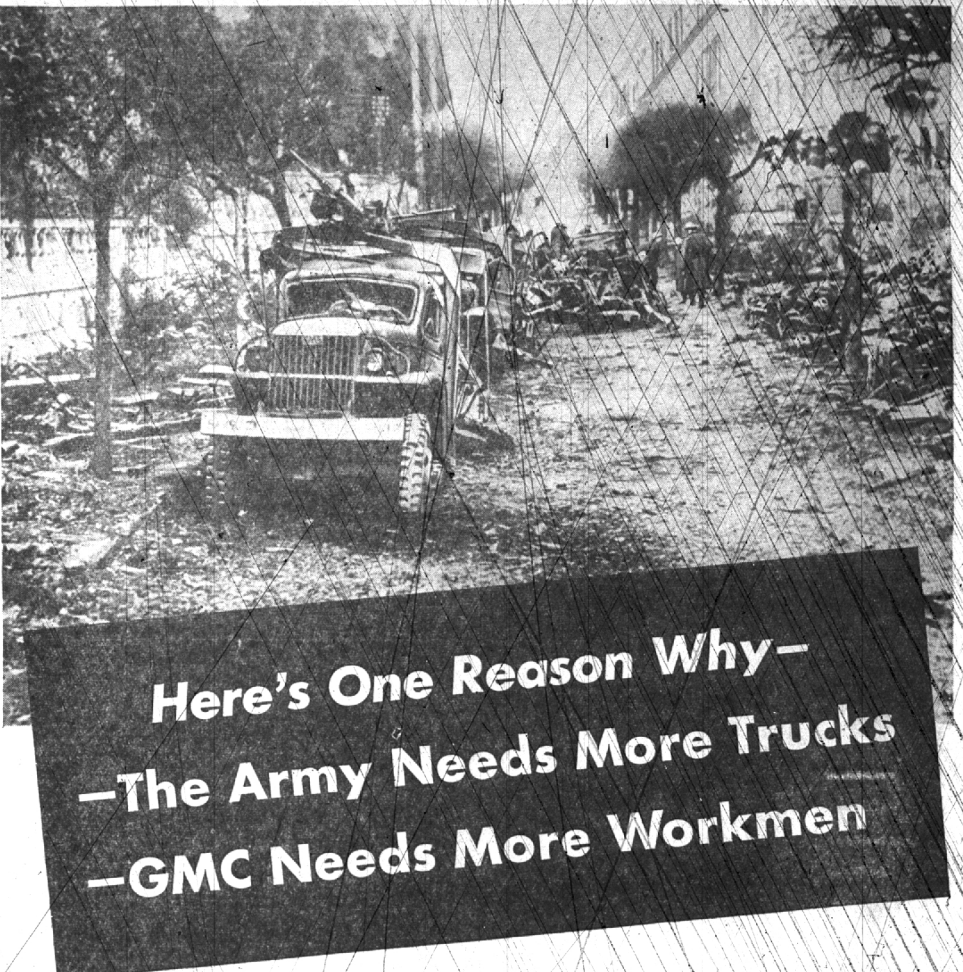
**ORCHESTRA TO BROADCAST**
