Heavy Enrollment At Michigan State

Birmingham is expected to be well represented at the campus when Michigan State college opens for the fall term of its 90th year on September 19.

A civilian student enrollment of more than 3,800, or 12 per cent greater than last year is looked for, according to Registrar R. S. Linton.

In addition to the civilian students, there will be about 750 soldiers and air corps reserve men training on the campus, Linton said.

New students will be registered Sept. 19-22, and returning students Sept. 23-25.

Classes will begin Sept. 25. Of those enrolling for the fall quarter, 2,500 will be returning students and 1,300 new students, Linton said.

Applications for admission are very heavy, he said, and point to an even larger final registration total.

Of the matriculating freshmen, 1,100 are women and 210 are men. The ratio of men to women at Michigan State this fall is about the same as last year.

Includes the incoming study body this fall will be approximately 125 veterans of World War discharged. They will be given special personal academic advice and special facilities and personnel of the college's new services-men's institute.
