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THE ECCENTRIC'S Camera Corner



It is very simple to stop motion in a picture if you snap the shutter when your subject reaches the peak of action.

SUMMER sports, regardless of where you see or where you go, always are exciting snapshot subjects. People are out playing golf, tennis, basketball, they ride horses, swim, go fishing, and do many other things, all of which make good picture subjects.

Stopping the action of summer sports is relatively simple. It's a good idea to always stand back a little way from the action—say twelve or fifteen feet, more in some cases—so that you'll be able to get and keep fast moving subjects in focus. Then too you'll have to use a somewhat higher shutter speed than normal. Where for ordinary snapshots you might set your shutter for 1/25th or 1/50th second at f/11, for action sports you'll have to increase those speeds to 1/100th or 1/200th second and set your lens aperture at f/8.

If you'll just try to catch your subject at the peak of the action, you'll make it easier for yourself to produce summer sports pictures which have the force and drama desired in every sports shot.

Catching the subject at the peak of action is really a trick practiced by many professional photographers—and you'll benefit by following their method. It simply means snapping your subject at the moment when the action is at its best. Technically, you might say that action reaches a peak whenever it has

Home Furnishings To Be Studied By Home Economics Clubs

How to make something new from something old will be the principal theme of home furnishings lessons to be presented to leaders of home economics clubs in Michigan this fall and winter by Miss Jessie Marjot and Mrs. Alfred Bartlett, home furnishings specialists of Michigan State College.

The classes will be conducted in all counties in the state, beginning in Bay City, Bay County, Oct. 3. Each county has selected one lesson from a list of seven which includes: How to repair spring unit cushions, homemade and remodeled furniture, the wonders of a coat of paint, arranging furniture, making rugs and mats, recovering lamp shades, and conserving chairs with pads and protectors.

Most popular lesson this year is the making of rugs—and mats. Twenty-one counties have designated this lesson for their classes, which will be held instead from October through April. Special lessons are also being scheduled by Miss Marjot and Mrs. Bartlett, making slip covers and re-finishings furniture.

All classes in the upper peninsula counties will be taught by Miss Emily Parker, district home demonstration agent.

The lessons on home furnishing are part of a series in three other fields of home economics, home management, nutrition and clothing.

Report Fair Crop Of Local Ducks On Lakes and Streams In This Area

There were a lot of Birmingham hunters missing from their usual business places yesterday forenoon as the wildfowling slotted around for the opening shots of the duck season. Just how many quacks they bagged has not been learned. Mister Quack Quack sort of kept up a racket in many of the favorite shooting grounds of the Birmingham crowd. It was intimated some of the boys returned home empty handed. Those taken were mostly local ducks.

There was a fair concentration of local ducks in the St. Clair flats.

In the south end of Saginaw Bay, observers reported some pitfalls, numerous teal and a good sprinkling of blacks and grays. Jackson reported ducks plentiful in the Waterloo game area and in lakes in Oakland, Washitaw and Jackson counties. Black mallards and teal are reported numerous on Tawas and Hubbard lakes with lighter than usual flocks voted in areas along the Lake Huron shore.

The wild rice crop on Tawas Lake is very good this season, as well as in many other places. Blacks and mallards are below that of last season.

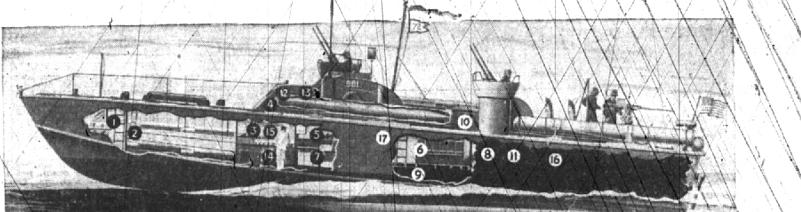
