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Nurses' Aides Class Being Formed Now by Oakland Red Cross

It is expected that a new day class of American Red Cross Volunteer Nurses' Aides will begin its course early in October. Persons between 18 and 50, have a High School education or its equivalent and have some leisure time are being urged to enroll in this class as services are urgently needed.

Mrs. F. J. Libbey will interview candidates at the American Red Cross Headquarters, Royal Oak on Wednesday from 2 to 4. Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills candidates may call Mrs. Donald Bay, Birmingham 2551 for an appointment. The Oakland County American Red Cross have to date graduated more than 400 volunteer Nurses' Aides. Twenty graduates have joined the Armed Forces, others are serving as Aides in Military Hospitals but the majority of the graduates are still serving in the Oakland County. They give from two to three thousand hours of service each month. One Aide has given more than 1500 hours and many have given 500 hours each. Last month Miss Bees Hodges of Clawson gave 170 hours of volunteer service in the Royal Oak Hospital. However it is becoming increasingly difficult to replace Graduate Nurses called to the Military Hospitals and more Aides are needed.
