**Boat Owners Worried As Motorboat Gas Is Given Another Cut**

The Birmingham boys with motor boats they plan to use for fall fishing, for trips out to their duck blinds far out in the shallow lakes and other autumn bits of boating received a shock this week when the OPA announced from Washington that gasoline rations for motorboats used for non-occupational purposes would be cut, commencing October 1.

The Office of Price Administration amended its regulations to allow:

Inboard motorboats, two gallons of gasoline for each rated horsepower, with a maximum of 24 gallons in any three-month period.

Outboard boats, 2 1/2 gallons per horsepower, with a maximum of 18 gallons quarterly.

Heretofore, under the same rated-horsepower formula, inboard boats have been permitted a maximum of 125 gallons and outboard boats a maximum of 20 gallons quarterly.

OPA said a limited number of boats in the Coast Guard Auxiliary or operated for conducting fishing trips would continue to receive rations under the old formula.
