

### Birmingham Residents Urged to Make Ready Now to Store Their Vegetables for Winter

Most folks with large gardens are looking forward to storing many vegetables for use during the winter. Selecting the vegetables so that they may be stored and will still be in good condition for later use is perhaps the most important part of this program.

Time was when the largest available beets and carrots were stored, and then everyone wondered why they had so little taste and were so tough when taken out of storage for cooking and eating.

It is now known that vegetables continue to mature in storage and that therefore those that are small and immature when pulled or picked are those most likely to taste good when removed from storage. So eat up those big carrots and beets now and plan to store the little fellows.

Not too little though. Those about three-quarters matured are best. The very small vegetables, if they are root crops, may be left in the ground until just before it freezes if they are protected with a much of straw. They will continue to grow and may be pulled at the last minute.

Carrots or beets that are stored when too young, will quickly wither in storage. Part of this is due to insufficient moisture which may be overcome by storing in a medium such as sand or sphagnum moss or peat moss, any of which will retain moisture for a long period of time. It is also possible, if storage is indoors, to spray the floor of the storage room with water to keep the air in it moist.

### Straits Ferries Autumn Schedule Is Now In Effect

Birmingham residents planning to drive to the upper peninsula should remember the fall schedule of Highway Department ferries at the Straits of Mackinac went into effect Sept. 15. The ferries leave both St. Ignace and Mackinac City at 6:00 a. m., 7:30 a. m., 9:00 a. m., 10:30 a. m., 12:00 noon, 1:30 p. m., 3:00 p. m., 4:30 p. m., 6:00 p. m., 7:30 p. m., and 9:00 p. m. All departures are given in Eastern War Time.

The new schedule will remain in effect until Nov. 10 when the annual Hunting Service schedule will become effective using three boats if necessary and operating without schedule day and night and as often as is necessary to take care of the hunters, giving a minimum of 1 1/2 hour service. 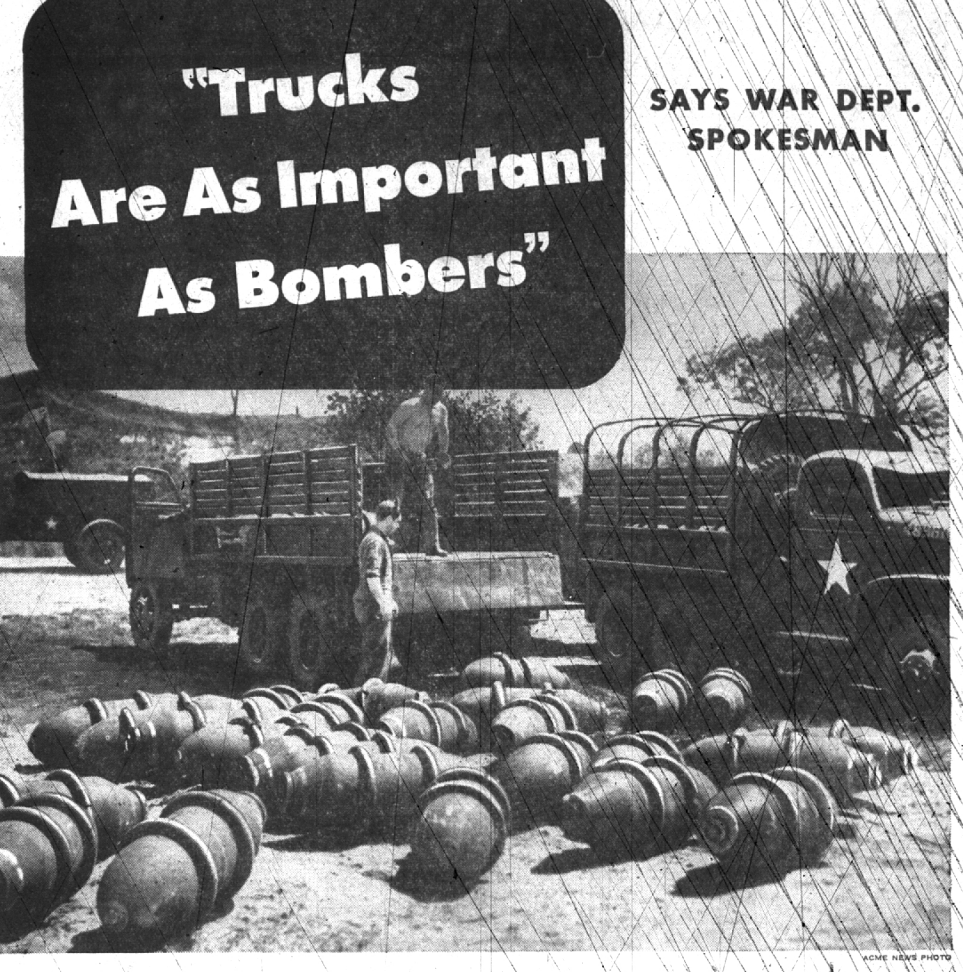
