Yonker in her talk, "Whose Government," Mrs. Yonker pointed, out to her listeners the importance of making the most of the "undeniable privileges and opportunity" for weighing and choosing the best candidates offered at elections. She put the questions, "What does it mean to live under a constitutional government? What are principles of constitutionalism?" and then proceeded with the four answers:

"(1) The great rules for governing ourselves shall be made by the process of proposal, discussion and popular decision at the
polls.

"(2) The powers of all officials shall be restrained by fundamental rights reserved by

the people.

"(3) All officials exercising power shall be

strained by fundamental rights reserved by
the people.

"(3) All officials exercising power shall be
chosen by the voters, directly or indirectly—
that is by appointment.
"(4) Directly elected persons, having
limited power for a term of years, shall be
automatically subjected to review at elections
held periodically.

The speaker then discussed the Party system of government saying, "It is fashionable
to curl the lip a little in speaking of parties
and party politics, However, the party system
is a fact—a fact we must live with. However,
we may criticlae political parties and party
like, we come right heat to the fact that we
still prefer our system of popular civilian
government, with all its ills, to a one party
military government such as we have seen in
Germany and Japan.

Then Mrs. Yonkers discussed the fitness
of American people to govern themselves
unless they make the most of their right to
vote. She put more questions, "How many
citizens ever take time to attend city commission meetings or school board meetings?
"Last July," she continued, "at primary
elections the several parties proposed certain
candidates? Did we discuss the merits of
these respective candidates? Did we make the
most intelligent choice? Did we register our
decisions at the polls?" Quoting from an official record, Mrs. Yonker stated that out of
5,243 registered voters in Birmingham, 859

colliding with obstacles. The Doctor discloses that bairs, hunting at night for food, emit a constant stream of cries pitched far above the range of human hearing. The cries are reflected by obstacles, such as trees or posts, and the bat, picking up the echoes, changes his course of flight to avoid collisions.

Thus, it seems, the bats use a natural radar system, based upon the principle of the echo of waves, bounced back by impact with obstacles approached.
